Education Planning Obligations - consultation on proposed policy changes

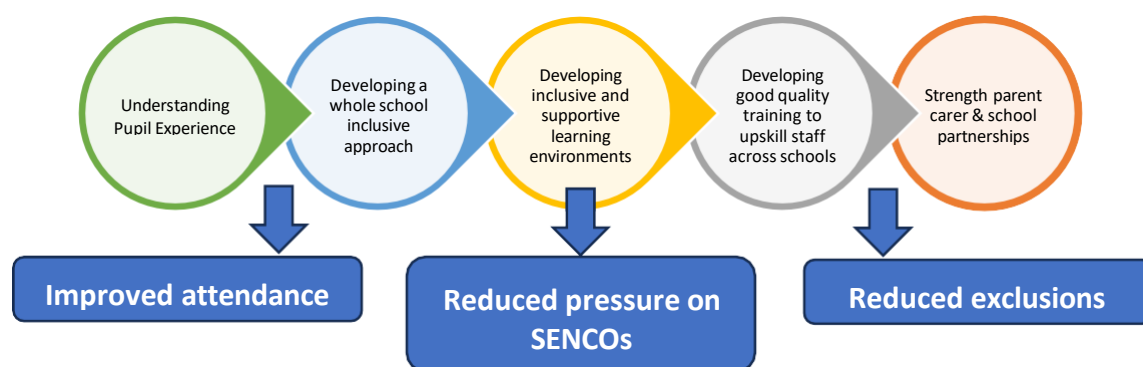
Worcestershire County Council is consulting on proposed updates to its Education Planning Obligations Policy, which guides how housing developers contribute to local education infrastructure. New housing developments often lead to increased demand for school and early years places. Where this demand can't be met through existing provision, developers may be required to make a financial contribution towards the cost of increasing local education places. The updated Policy reflects national and local changes, rising demand for specialist SEND provision, and the latest Department for Education guidance. If approved, it will apply to planning applications submitted from 1 September 2025.

Creating Inclusive Practice through 'PINS' so ALL Children Thrive (Partnership for Inclusion of Neurodiversity in Schools)

We all have different thought patterns and processes; it is part of the natural variation of neurodiversity. The Partnerships for Inclusion of Neurodiversity in Schools (PINS) project is a new national initiative to support good outcomes for all pupils in mainstream primary schools, by embracing neurodiversity. Worcestershire has an exciting opportunity for 30 primary schools to join the national PINS programme and be part of this new way of thinking.

By recognising we all have different cognitive processes, PINS benefits all pupils because the changes in practice will provide the conditions for **all** pupils to thrive. PINS aims to work in partnership with primary schools, parent carer forums and local services to develop inclusive provision. The project will focus on strengthening knowledge, skills and improving learning environments to better meet the needs of ALL pupils and improve outcomes for children with neurodiverse needs. It achieves this by:



What does each school receive?

- Support to Develop Co-production with Parent Carers
- 37 hours of funded external expert support
- Resources & New Ways of Working
- Networking Across Schools & Services

To identify support needs schools will complete a self-assessment tool. A multi-agency project group (made of up Local Authority, NHS Herefordshire and Worcestershire and Worcestershire Parent Carer Forum) will work with schools to understand what is working well and where support is needed. A package of support will be discussed with the school and commissioned by the project group. Support will be purchased by LA/NHS from a combination of local system providers (health, education etc), external programmes and private providers.

Eligibility, Selection & Timescale

We intend to allocate PINS to 5 primary schools in each of the 6 Worcestershire Districts. All schools will be eligible to submit an expression of interest. The programme will run from April 2025-March 2026.

Schools that wish to participate in this programme are asked to submit a short '[Expression of Interest form.](#)' The deadline for submissions is **Friday 23rd May.**

From this information schools will be selected based on analysis of education and health data to inform and understanding of need. A full list will be published on the SEND Local Offer.

Children and Young People's 0-25 years Neurodivergence Support Service

Families and young people have told us how important it is to get help early for neurodivergent support needs. In response, Herefordshire and Worcestershire NHS are commissioning a new service to provide support for young people aged 0-25 years and their families. People will self-refer to access age-appropriate advice and support on a range of issues delivered through workshops and one-to-one support. This is likely to include support on sensory & communication needs, emotional regulation, healthy diet, sleep routine strategies, masking and self-management strategies to support daily living. The service will also work closely with other services in both counties to link families into more specialist support where needed and provide advice to wider professionals. Commissioning will take place over the rest of this year and the service is expected to be in place in Spring 2026. Lived experience experts will be part of the panel awarding the contract.

Neurodiversity Themed Teachmeets

We are looking to share some of the amazing practice that happens across Worcestershire, with teachers sharing classroom ideas directly with teachers! We are looking at putting on a number of Teachmeets in Worcestershire to allow the supportive sharing of ideas.

A Teachmeet is an organised (but informal) meeting where participants are offered a variety of nano (three-minute) or macro (six-minute) presentations on a particular theme. Participants can be actively involved as presenters, or can simply relax and listen to all that will be on offer. It usually takes place in a hall or similar (depending on numbers) and there is a running order of who is presenting what (time scales are kept to tightly!). The idea is that attendees will listen to a load of ideas (usually around 20 to 25 strats) that are practical and useable in the classroom around a particular need.

We are looking to run 3 teachmeets a year for High Schools (one a term) in the North for and three in the South.

We are also looking to run 3 teachmeets a year for Primary Schools (one a term) in the North for and three in the South.

WCC will handle the bookings and planning of these sessions (who is presenting, time keeping etc) BUT we need venues! We would need high schools and primary schools in the North and South who would be willing to be a venue for the evening (Teachmeets are likely to run 6pm to 7:30pm (to be confirmed!). Coffees and tea would also be most welcome!

A key aspect of the Teachmeet is that they are FREE and an encouraging space for any teacher to attend (in fact, it is likely that other school staff would benefit from it too).

We are looking at having the 3 Teachmeets around supporting neurodiversity/neurodivergence and so it is likely that themes for a Teachmeet might include: sensory, transitions, planning, executive function etc

Co-production officers for children and young people

Two new Co-production Officers have just come into post to improve engagement with children and young people with SEND. Amy Knight and Chanika Benain are now looking to connect with young people through schools and colleges, through the voluntary sector and by attending events across the county. They want to know what young people want from the both the county council and local health services and how we, as a local area partnership, can provide them a voice to be heard. Amy and Chanika can then start to link young people with the services they wish to be a part of.

They are now looking for help in meeting children and young people. They are working with any age up to and including 25 years old and the only requirement is that they have an additional need. This does not mean that they need to be formally diagnosed, or need to have an EHCP, but just a need that requires more than what is ordinarily offered. They can meet them face to face, or chat online. They can do this at school or in their local youth club; they just need them to hear that we want to work with them and be interested!

Training And Professional Development Opportunities

RISE Training: New Sensory Processing e-Learning

This new e-learning introduces sensory processing: what it is and why it matters and is intended to be used by a wide variety of practitioners, especially those working directly with disabled children and young people and those with special educational needs. This course was originally developed as training by the Early Years SEND Partnership and has now been re-purposed to create this e-learning that is now delivered through the RISE (Research and Improvement for SEND Excellence) Programme, a contract funded by the DfE.

The course covers the following topics:

- Sensory systems and sensory processing differences
- Practical application of the theory and where to go for support
- Sensory environments

ELSA: Emotional Literacy Support Assistants

The Educational Psychology Service are excited to be able to continue to offer ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistants) training and supervision for practitioners working in Primary / First / Middle Secondary schools across Worcestershire.

The ELSA programme has been widely adopted as an evidence-based early intervention for children and young people in over 100 local authorities in the UK. ELSAs attend training days and group supervision sessions led by Educational Psychologists. They will be trained to plan and deliver individualised programmes of support for children to develop their emotional literacy, within a range of different areas. The initial training is a mix of psychological theory and application of theory to support children and young people. The training involves discussion, activities and sharing of helpful resources. Resources to support work as an ELSA are shared and all delegates will be provided with a copy of the book "Emotional Wellbeing: An Introductory Handbook" within the price of the course.

The initial training covers the following areas of emotional literacy:

- Day 1 – An Introduction to ELSA and emotional literacy: **please note: The line-manager or headteacher will be required to join their ELSA(s) for the morning of Day 1.**
- Day 2 – Security and affiliation (sense of belonging)
- Day 3 – Self-esteem, motivation and developing feelings of competency and self-efficacy
- Day 4 – Loss and bereavement
- Day 5 – Managing emotions and social/friendship skills
- Day 6 – Active listening, therapeutic stories and measuring outcomes

Shine A Light - Sharing Effective Practice

Innovative Worcestershire SEN provision wins prestigious national innovation award

Heart of Worcestershire College and disability charity National Star have won a prestigious education award for their work with young people with special educational needs and disabilities. They were named winner in the innovative specialist/mainstream partnership working category at the Natspec Innovation Awards. The two organisations were praised for their innovative collaboration to launch a specialist provision based at The Heart of Worcestershire College campus in Worcester.

The category judge said: "This is a genuinely innovative three-way partnership between a local authority, a specialist FE college, and a general FE college. It brings students both the benefits of highly specialised provision and the benefits of manageable commutes and learning skills for adulthood in the area round their homes. The involvement of a local authority to help facilitate partnership between, a general and a specialist college is hugely innovative and goes beyond one year's place planning to multi-year planning for future need. This partnership is beneficial to its own students, and it also represents a proof of concept that should be learned from nationally."

Launched in September 2024, National Star delivers specialist education and therapy to five students with complex needs in the College's St Wulstan's Building, Deansway, Worcester.

The new teaching and therapeutic space were made possible thanks to grant from Worcestershire County Council. The space includes three classrooms, an accessible kitchen to learn life skills, a dedicated therapy space, an outdoor courtyard and access to two realistic independent flats for learners to prepare for life after college. Its central location will enable students to access and learn in the college community and the community of Worcestershire. There has been much interest in the provision, and it is expected to increase its numbers in September 2025.
